

### Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

Ur greatest joy is declared in these words; our deepest hope rests on them. We go "all out" for our Easter services to express that joy—with choirs, flowers, and our brightest colors in worship, including gold. Often overlooked is the tradition that Easter is a season of joy, not simply one Sunday. Earlier generations called it Eastertide, or a "week of



weeks," consisting of the seven Sundays leading up to the Day of Pentecost. There are traditions associated with each of the Sundays, a few of which I'm going to highlight here. Taken together, the entire season tells the story of how the power of Jesus' victory over death transforms us and the world.

+The second Sunday of Easter tells the story of the disciples taking the resurrection message to heart. The tale of Thomas' movement from skepticism to faith is told in dramatic fashion each year. (This is one of my favorite preaching texts of the year.) We see Jesus' disciples transformed into "apostles", sent out to declare the message of new life in His name.

+It may seem a bit odd but this week has been known as "Low Sunday". This designation is based on our return to regular worship routines after the more elaborate and grand flourishes of the Easter Vigil and Easter Day. Some church members glibly comment that it also reflects much lower attendance than the previous week. Finally, there is no truth to the notion that this is designated as an official vacation Sunday for pastors. (Ob my! I am taking it for a vacation weekend for a family wedding in Texas. It was a coincidence, really).

+ The fourth Sunday of Easter is known as "Good Shepherd Sunday." All three years of our lectionary readings assign a portion of John 10 as the Gospel for the day, along with Psalm 23. We see Jesus as the true shepherd who rescues, gathers, and feeds us as his flock, for which he has given his life to protect and preserve.

+The Ascension of our Lord is marked on the fortieth day following Easter, as the scriptures recount it. It marks the end of our risen Lord's days among his followers. This year it falls on May 5 (always a Thursday). Jesus departs from the Mount of Olives and returns to the "right hand of the Father", as we declare in the historic creeds.

+Among many Christians, Ascension Day ranks as the third most important festival of the liturgical year, behind Easter and Christmas. Like many Abiding Hope's mission is to be a loving family...

Easter is an explosion of hope, propelling us from halting disbelief into fervent witness and genuine love for our neighbors, both near and far. It is the lift off for every believer filled with the joy of seeing the presence of the risen Lord at work in humble

hearts. Easter is the unfolding of the future in which death has lost its sting (I Cor. 15.55) and 'power and riches, wisdom and strength, honor and blessing, and glory" belong to God and our risen Savior, Jesus Christ (Rev. 7.12).

## Council Spends Day on Ministry Planning

n Saturday, March 12, the church council and Pastor Connor spent a half-day session looking at the congregation's cultural changes that have significantly imchallenges in mission and ministry. Pastor Connor and the council members took time to know each other better, beginning with an exercise of personal introductions.

Through the introductions, the council reviewed much of the history of the congregation, sharing how each of them came to be at Abiding Hope. Like many AHLC members, council members include lifelong Lutherans, along with folks who have come from many other traditions. Just as varied were the needs and motivations that drew each person to join the congrega-

tion.

Pastor Connor shared some of the pacted congregational life in recent years. Americans have moved away from being 'joiners'; participation in group activities has dramatically dropped. This includes churches, civic clubs (Lions, Rotary, etc.), and sport leagues like bowling and softball. He noted that some activities like bowling remain popular, but committing to long term involvement has nearly disappeared.

From that development comes the growth of persons who choose not to participate in any religious community. Approximately 1 in 5 adults identify themselves as

"none" when asked about religious affiliation. This segment of the population has shown the greatest growth of any identified group since studies began in the 1980s.

Pastor Connor shared that these adults, many in the age group 22-45, also call themselves "spiritual, but not religious." When asked, they report that they strive to live ethically; they regularly pray, and even read the Bible and/or other inspirational literature. Many participate in community service efforts, including justice and environ- build congregational unity and excitement. mental efforts. What they are seeking is a community where they can find a sense of genuine belonging and opportunities to 'make a difference', that is, live out their strongly held values. Pastor Connor asserted that faith communities remain uniquely equipped to provide these things.

The discussion concluded with two exercises. The first was forming a 'mission slogan' for the congregation. The slogan is meant to be a simple statement for introducing the work and purpose of the congregation. The group arrived at this-- "On the move with Christ", reflecting both our upcoming relocation and a commitment to action for Christ's purposes in our community. The council welcomes and encourages every

The final exercise was to dig deeper into one of the elements from the Lenten study Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations. Council members brainstormed some ideas for practicing 'Radical Hospitality' here at

Abiding Hope. Strategies were set that were considered as 'simple and easy to do' and those that would be "big and bold." Here are some of the ideas:

+ Train greeters and ushers to assist visitors to quickly understand the basics of worship.

+ Have more all-member events, to

## Abiding Hope Council Update

t the March 8 meeting, the February 2 minutes were approved. Written- and verbalcommittee reports were received. The complete minutes may be found on the bulletin board in Fellowship Hall. Highlights include:

- Pr. Dave C. reported his FIRST IMPRESSIONS (Congregation seems generally friend-ly and comfortable among themselves; Leadership seems a bit overburdened and stressed to greater degree than general membership; Congregation seems solid in Lutheran identity and tradition), his OBSERVATIONS/CONCERNS (Congregation seems segmented into several small groups possibly centered around worship sched-ule); Late arrivals and early departures; Connection of the congregation and the community is hard to see; Demographic profile (especially age); Connection to synod and wider church seems weak; Level of excitement/engagement regarding relocation seems low, and his INITIAL RECOMMENDATIONS: (Reconfigure worship schedule prior to relocation; Possible "Every Member" contact process and outreach; Intensive outreach/ publicity campaign leading up to relocation; Identify and engage local ministry partners—become part of an active cluster?
- The Parochial/Congregational report is due.
- Pr. Dave C. will be on vacation March 30- April 5 (for a family event) and he will participate in a continuing education event April 17-18 (beginning after worship).
- The memorials/fundraising/capital funds campaign planning continues with Pr. Dave C. consulting members of the congregation and Kevin P. serving as council liaison in this endeavor.
- New business None.

pril is designated as "Child Abuse Prevention Month". Unfortunately, child abuse occurs all too frequently as this article will explain. In my association with the homeless population, I have listened to many stories from victims who have experienced personal abuse in one way or another.

Please read this article and remember that victims can not only be the young but our elderly. And it is our responsibility to protect them and to report the abuse.

hild Abuse: Injury, or even death, of a child through abuse is frightfully common. Child abuse can result from physical, emotional, or sexual harm; and it can even result from neglect. There are multiple causes, including households that suffer alcoholism, anger issues, and substance abuse.

#### Definition

Child abuse is widespread and can occur in any cultural, ethnic, and income group. Child abuse can be physical, emotional, verbal, or sexual. It can also result from neglect. Abuse can result in serious injury to the child and possibly even death.

Studies show that one in four girls and one in eight boys are sexually abused before the age of 18, and that approximately one in 20 children are physically abused each year. Physical abuse involves harming a child by, for example, burning, beating, or breaking their bones. Child sexual abuse is the deliberate exposure of a minor child to sexual activity that the child cannot comprehend behavior. Conduct a formal examination only if you have reason to or consent to. This means a child is forced or talked into sex or sexual activities by another person. This behavior includes acts such as inappropriate touching of a child's breasts or genitalia, someone exposing their genitalia to a child, fondling, oral-genital contact, genital and anal intercourse, as well as exhibitionism, voyeurism, and exposure to pornography.

Child neglect occurs when someone does not provide the necessities of life to a child, either intentionally or with reckless disregard for the child's well-being. This can include physical neglect, such as withholding food, clothing, shelter, or other necessities. Emotional neglect includes withholding love or comfort or affection. Medical neglect occurs when medical care is withheld. **Symptoms** 

It's not always easy to recognize when a child has been abused. Children who are abused are often afraid to complain because they are fearful that they will be blamed or that no one will believe them or because the person who abused them is someone they love very much. Parents are often unable to recognize symptoms of abuse because they may not want to face the truth.

If you suspect a child has been sexually abused, the child should be examined as soon as possible by a trained health care professional; it can't be stressed enough that an abused child needs access to special support and treatment as soon as possible. A doctor's exam should not be delayed for any reason. Many signs of injury related to sexual abuse are temporary. Ideally, the exam should occur within 72 hours of the event or discovery. A complete physical exam must always be performed, so that the examiner can look for any signs of physical and sexual abuse. The two forms of abuse may coexist. The longer the abuse continues, the less likely the child will make full recovery.

Watch out for unexplained changes in your child's body or suspect your child has been abused. Otherwise, the child may become fearful. Be alert to any of the following changes:

Signs of Physical Abuse: Any injury (bruise, burn, fracture, abdominal or head injury) that cannot be explained

Signs of Sexual Abuse: Fearful behavior (nightmares, depression, unusual fears, attempts to run away); abdominal pain, bedwetting, uri-

nary tract infection, genital pain or bleeding, sexually transmitted disease; extreme sexual behavior that seems inappropriate for the child's age

Signs of Emotional Abuse. Sudden change in self-confidence; headaches or stomachaches with no medical cause; abnormal fears, increased nightmares or attempts to run away

Signs of Emotional Neglect: Failure to gain weight (especially in infants), desperately affectionate behavior, voracious appetite and stealing food

#### Treatments

If you suspect a child has been abused, contact a pediatrician or a local child protective agency for help. Physicians are legally obligated to report all suspected cases of abuse or neglect to authorities. They can also recommend a therapist and provide the necessary information for investigators. Doctors may also testify in court to obtain legal protection for the child or to help criminally prosecute an individual suspected of engaging in child sexual abuse.

Whatever the nature of the abuse, steps should be taken immediately to report the abuse and obtain help. Delaying a report decreases the child's chances for full recovery.

If he or she has been abused, your child will benefit from the services of a qualified mental health professional. You and other members of the family may be advised to seek counseling so that you'll be able to provide the support and comfort your child

needs. If someone in your family is responsible for the abuse, a mental health professional may be able to treat that person successfully, as well.

If your child has been abused, you may be the only person who can help him or her. Do not delay reporting your suspicions of abuse. Denying the problem will only worsen the situation; allowing the abuse to continue decreases the child's chance for full recovery. In any case of child abuse, the safety of the abused youngster is of primary concern. He or she needs to be in a safe environment free of the potential for continuing abuse.

In most cases, children who are abused or neglected suffer greater emotional than physical damage. A child who has been abused or otherwise severely mistreated may become depressed or develop suicidal, withdrawn, or violent behavior. An older child may use drugs or alcohol, try to run away, or abuse others. The younger the child is and the closer the child's relationship to the abuser, the more serious the emotional damage will be. As adults, they may develop marital and sexual difficulties, depression or suicidal behavior.
