

A Message from your Council President

n order to maintain good communication within our congregation, I wanted to wanted to make sure take this opportunity to address a few rumors that I have heard over the last few weeks.

First, I have heard from several folks as to "Why didn't the council do more to keep Pastor John?" The first time anyone on council heard anything about John leaving was when he called an emergency meeting to tell us he was leaving. As we have gone have learned that this is actually the way it is done. The leaving pastor does not tell his/ her congregation until he/she has already accepted a new call. When Pastor John consulted with the Bishop, the Bishop did suggest options for John including going parttime and taking a sabbatical but John felt the time was right for him to move on. He was with us for 14+ years. The average length of a pastor call in the ELCA is under 6 years so we certainly were blessed to exceed that.

Secondly, I have heard a few complaints of late that no one but the council and the building committee are involved in the construction of the new church. This is just not the case. We have had over 50 different folks involved with several different committees as we have gone through the process. That is over 60% of the congregation!! When we started this process, the council in selecting the building committee, made sure there was a good cross-section of the congregation represented. We have younger and older folks, newer and older

members. The council as decisions were made that they were made with the entire congregation in mind.

Now, the building committee has certainly been given leeway in making a lot of decisions and rightly so. With all the decisions that have had to happen along with all the things that go into building a new facility, through the call process for a new pastor, we there is no way that all those decisions could be brought to the congregation for individual votes. It would take us 20 years to build a church if that were to happen. Back to the building committee selection process - that is why we ensured a good cross-section of the congregation was on the committee so that everyone's concerns would be heard, reviewed, and considered. In addition, we also have the suggestion box. Every single suggestion was reviewed and considered. The book in the Narthex contains every suggestion that was received along with a response. Not every suggestion could be incorporated in the new design but every one of them was considered.

> In just a few short weeks we all will be making a decision on whether to call a new pastor, Pastor Allie Leitzel, or to continue to look for a replacement for John. I ask you to do three things. First, review the site profile (resume) for Allie. Jot down any questions or concerns you have. Review the compensation package in detail so that you understand it. Both of these will be provided

Children's Eye Health and Safety Month

It's almost back-to-school time and you're prepared with your child's enrollment forms, orientation schedules, and immunizations--but what about their eyes?

August is Children's Eye Health and Safety Month—a great signal for you to get your child's eyes checked before school starts.

Join us as we observe Children's Eye Health and Safety Month in partnership with Prevent Blindness America and the American Academy of Ophthalmologists.

Most children have healthy eyes. But there are conditions that can threaten good vision. Because you can't always "look" into your child's eyes to tell if they have eye health problems, set up some time today for an eye exam:

- Your child's eyes should be examined during regular pediatric appointments and vision testing should be conducted around age three.
- Parents should be aware of signs that may indicate their child has vision problems, including:
- Wandering or crossed eyes
- A family history of childhood vision problems
- Disinterest in reading or viewing distant objects
- Squinting or turning the head in an unusual manner while watching television
 *Nearly 25 percent of school-aged children have vision problems. Of children ages 3 to

Talk to your child's pediatrician if you suspect your child has any of the eye diseases below:

- Amblyopia (lazy eye)
- Strabismus (crossed eyes)

- Ptosis (drooping of the eyelid)
- Color deficiency (color blindness)
- Refractive errors (nearsightedness, farsightedness and astigmatism)

Let's Talk Eye Safety:

Use this month to discuss the importance of eye safety with your children.

More than 12 million children suffer from vision impairment, and eye injuries are one of the leading causes of vision loss in children*. There are an estimated 42,000 sportsrelated eye injuries each year and the majority of them happen to children.

Children should:

- Wear protective eyewear while participating in sports or recreational activities
- Play with age-appropriate toys. Avoid toys with sharp or protruding parts

One of the best ways to ensure your child keeps his/her good vision throughout life is to set a good health example.

*Nearly 25 percent of school-aged children have vision problems. Of children ages 3 to 5, close to one in 20 has a problem that could result in permanent vision loss if left untreated. The American Academy of Ophthalmology estimates that 80 percent of preschoolers do not receive vision screenings.
