biding Hope is a direct result of fellow Lutherans who were willing to pay it forward.

In 1896, Luther Memorial, gave of their time and money to establish a mission church at Liberty Street and Brown Avenue. Zion's Lutheran Church ministered to their neighborhood for more than 100 years.

In 1955 another inner city church: St. Matthew's gave of their time and money to establish a mission church even further out at 54th and Peach. Our Savior's Lutheran Church continued under that name until 2002.

At that time Zion's and Our Savior paid forward their gifts and consolidated under the name of Abiding Hope Lutheran Church.

Because Christians, long since gone, have expressed their faith without expectation of any return, we find ourselves where we are today.

And where are we?

We have paid off a \$370,000 mortgage. We have built a brand new, energy efficient church surrounded by private residences as far as the eye can see. And we were able to do this without taking on debt. God has truly blessed this congregation.

There will be expenses incurred in the actual move to W. Grandview Blvd. that are not part of the construction budget. There are items that cannot be moved, items that need to be moved professionally and items that are simply not worth moving. The actual cost of transition will be somewhere around the \$25,000 to \$30,000 range. We need to understand that these expenses are not for things that are nice to have, but for things that we need to have. So it is time for us to follow our forebear's example and pay it forward.

The last verses of Matthew, often referred to as The Great Commission of Jesus stated the following: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

Jesus is telling them, AND US, that their teaching is not to be limited to one time and place.

The ministry of Abiding Hope has its roots in at least five different worship spaces. We are moving to a sixth, but our mission, as impossible as it sounds is still the same..."go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit..."

In contemporary language, he is telling them, and us, it's time to pay it forward. Amen.

Ceramic tile has been laid, ceiling fans and lights are installed, closet doors have been installed and trim painted. Narthex and altar wall stone work is complete and ready for the installation of our cross. The elevator installation is very close to being complete. The stairwell has been painted and lighting installed. We are looking more like the beautiful church we envisioned each day.

On the lower level the vinyl flooring has been laid and Sunday school rooms are ready for carpet installation. Bathrooms are ready for commodes and sinks. The Food Pantry has begun to be cleared of stored items and will soon have a sealed floor. The Community Room is ready for carpeting and our kitchen awaits the installation of our countertop.

Outside the sidewalks are nearly finished; grading of the parking lot begins next week. The canopy is finished and looks lovely and will prove to be a nice addition. Renaud-Peck has donated top-soil which will help in the huge landscaping project we are about to begin.

The Committee continues to work diligently to keep the finances in check while being aware of the need to spend to secure the site as well-built, safe, functional and economical to run.

Juvenile Diabetes



hat is Juvenile Arthritis?

Juvenile arthritis (JA) is not a disease in itself. Also known as pediatric rheumatic disease, JA is an umbrella term used to describe the many autoimmune and inflammatory conditions or pediatric rheumatic diseases that can develop in children under the age of 16. Juvenile arthritis affects nearly 300,000 children in the United States.

Although the various types of juvenile arthritis share many common symptoms, like pain, joint swelling, redness and warmth, each type of JA is distinct and has its own special concerns and symptoms. Some types of juvenile arthritis affect the musculoskeletal system, but joint symptoms may be minor or nonexistent. Juvenile arthritis can also involve the eyes, skin, muscles and gastrointestinal tract. Types of Juvenile Arthritis

- Juvenile idiopathic arthritis (JIA). Considered the most common form of arthritis, JIA includes six subtypes: oligoarthritis, polyarthritis, systemic, enthesitis-related, juvenile psoriatic arthritis or undifferentiated.
- Juvenile dermatomyositis. An inflammatory disease, juvenile dermatomyositis causes muscle weakness and a skin rash on the Each of the different types of JA have their eyelids and knuckles.
- Juvenile lupus. Lupus is an autoimmune disease. The most common form is systemic lupus erythematosus, or SLE. Lupus can affect the joints, skin, kidneys, blood and other areas of the body. Juvenile scleroderma. Scleroderma, which

literally means "hard skin," describes a group of conditions that causes the skin to tighten and harden.

- Kawasaki disease. This disease causes blood-vessel inflammation that can lead to heart complications.
- Mixed connective tissue disease. This disease may include features of arthritis, lupus dermatomyositis and scleroderma, and is associated with very high levels of a particular antinuclear antibody called anti-RNP.
- Fibromyalgia. This chronic pain syndrome is an arthritis-related condition, which can cause stiffness and aching, along with fatigue, disrupted sleep and other symptoms. More common in girls, fibromyalgia is seldom diagnosed before puberty.

Juvenile Arthritis Causes

No known cause has been pinpointed for most forms of juvenile arthritis, nor is there evidence to suggest that toxins, foods or allergies cause children to develop JA. Some research points toward a genetic predisposition to juvenile arthritis, which means the combination of genes a child receives from his or her parents may cause the onset of JA when triggered by other factors.

Juvenile Arthritis Diagnosis

The most important step in properly treating juvenile arthritis is getting an accurate diagnosis. The diagnostic process can be long and detailed. There is no single blood test that confirms any type of JA. In children, the key to diagnosis is a careful physical exam, along with a thorough medical history. Any specific tests a doctor may perform will depend upon the type of JA suspected.

Juvenile Arthritis Treatment

Unfortunately, there is no cure for juvenile arthritis, although with early diagnosis and aggressive treatment, remission is possible. The goal of treatment is to relieve inflammation, control pain and improve the child's quality of life. Most treatment plans involve

a combination of medication, physical activity, eye care and healthy eating. Juvenile Arthritis Self Care

An important part of JA treatment is teaching the child the importance of how to follow the treatment prescribed by the healthcare team. Self care also involves helping the child address the emotional and social effects of the disease. Self management encompasses the choices made each day to live well and stay healthy and happy.

bout one-hundred and forty-five participants celebrated the arts and the God-given talents and skills that enrich our lives, with an exploration of how dance, music, and the visual arts have shaped our Christian Spirituality and tradition, given expression to our vocation, and enhanced our worship of the Triune God. All this - along with taking care of the necessary business items of our agenda, worshipping, and enjoying fellowship together. It was a busy three days.

Hear Yea! Hear Yea!

The Call Committee has recommended a Pastoral candidate to the Church Council. The call process will continue.



Reports were received from the Bishop and the Treasurer. Our synod presently has 81 congregations, 23 of those without a pastor. We are asked to direct/refer any folks who are being pulled by the Spirit and may be discerning their path in ministry to the synod office. There is a need for not only ordained ministers (through the seminary or the newly-updated TEEM process), but also for Lay Worship Leaders. We presently have 3 people from this synod in the ordination process. Much of the knowledge gained through developing this synod's TEEM process, along with our new Manual for Candidacy, is proving very helpful to the ELCA churchwide offices. Two congregations have completed their ministries this year: Emanuel, Titusville and Elam, Anita. Two congregations are voting on disaffiliation with the ELCA. The legalities of the 2014 theft case (\$155,000) are drawing to a close. Sentencing and the receipt of a restitution check is scheduled for July 2016. None of the congregations' Mission Support gifts received have been affected by this. New steps have been implemented to safeguard against future occurrences.

- Reports and/or presentations were received from our synod agencies and institutions: Lutherlyn, Bethesda Children's Home, Lutheran Home at Kane, Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, Lutheran Seniorlife, LAMPa, Lutheran Service Society, GladeRun Lutheran Services, Pennsylvania Council of Churches, Village at Luther Square, Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia. Verbal reports were also received from Women of the ELCA (SWO), Thiel College, our Vocations Committee, the Institute for Ministry Education, the Leadership Support Committee, and our Reformation 500 team.
- The total budget of \$836,870 (\$852,808 in 2016) was approved with 50 cents of every \$1.00 received for mission support (undesignated gifts from congregations and individuals) passed on to the churchwide offices.
- The election of a new synod council vice president, board member for the Lutheran Home at Kane, and of Bethesda Children's Home, plus members to serve on the Discipline and Consultation committees occurred.
- Three keynote presentations were received: 1). Scott Weidler who serves the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America as Program Director for Worship and Music presented "Singing in Community" and a forum on "SMALL PACKAGES – HIDDEN TREASURES: Making music in smaller congregations"; 2). C.. Noelle Partusch is an Associate Professor of dance at Mercyhurst University and specializes in Labanotation and liturgical dance. Her keynote address was "Liturgical Dance: Prayer is More than Folding Your Hands". NOTE: Ms. Partusch and three of her students participated as worship leaders throughout the assembly; and

- 3). Robyn Sand Anderson, a native of Decorah, IA, has a Bachelor of Arts degree in Fine Art and Art Education. Sand Anderson quietly showed us that non-objective painting expresses those things that are hard to understand or explain, wrestling with the mystery of life's questions. Her keynote presentation was "Faith Expression through the Visual Arts". Two breakout sessions with the choice of 9 forums for learning and sharing were offered. These Christian Spirituality and the Arts-themed forums included wood sculpturing, readings from his written work by the "prophet of Oniontown", a living presentation of the Meal in the Upper Room, and creating prayer shawls, among others.
- Recognition of Rostered Leaders Anniversaries (Note: Rev. John Coleman 15 years) and Congregational Anniversaries (Note: 2 local congregations celebrated benchmark anniversaries: St John Lutheran Church, Girard with 150 years and Messiah Lutheran Church, Erie with 100 years). Recognition of congregations that fulfilled their Mission Support gift pledges and the presentation of the McCoid Order to a pastor actively involved in the Kairos Ministry.
- Eight synod council recommendations were acted upon, including that the Synod's Compensation Guidelines reflect an increase to the base salary of slightly less than 2%, and that the Synod's Mission Support Formula be affirmed (20% of total current regular giving by members), among others.
- The Memorials and Resolutions that were acted upon are posted on the Abiding Hope bulletin board. The topics included military personnel, veterans, and their families; the Doctrine of Discovery; refugees; urging divestment from fossil fuel corporations; and support of the unification of PA seminaries.

Worshipping together:

- Memorial Liturgy (a Taize-style worship service) remembering all our departed saints (Necrology: THE REVEREND DR. STANFORD O. STENSON and THE REVEREND EMERY EARL "Scoop" OKERLUND).
- Festival Eucharist with the Ordination of Benjamin David Austin Morning Prayer
- The assembly was followed by a special travel presentation, "On the Trail of Martin Luther". A representative of Collette Gateway® supplied detailed information about this NWPA Synod, ELCA-sponsored trip scheduled for July 12-22, 2017. This 11-day trip starts at \$3,999 and includes round-trip air from Pittsburgh plus 14 meals.
